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Petaluma Council Members:

By now you've all likely heard about the lithium battery farm fire at Moss Landing. Here's a link to the story out today in the Petaluma Patch:

According to the story, not only did the farm have a big fire this week, it had **two "overheating events" in 2021 and 2022 and a "third incident happened in 2022 in the neighboring Elkhorn battery plant that is owned by PG&E."** Jodie Lutkenhaus, professor of chemical engineering at Texas A&M University, who was quoted in the story, said **there is a need to find safer batteries that can be used on the grid.**

Given this information, and multiple fire events at these plants, I strongly urge the Petaluma City Council to reject PG&E's plan for its proposed battery farm next to the Adobe Creek Community. **Any battery farm needs to be miles away from the community, not right in the middle of it.** The proposed location next to the Adobe Creek community is also very close to Casa Grande High School, close to Wiseman Park and way too close to a large number of houses and apartments. And our fire risks here in Sonoma County are much higher than they are at Moss Landing and Monterey County.

Furthermore, PG&E's safety record for its infrastructure is abysmal. Don't let them further threaten our beautiful community.
